THE GOOD LIVES MODEL AS A POSITIVE PSYCHOLOGY APPROACH: CLINICAL AND COUNSELING APPLICATIONS

About the Program:

The 'Good Lives Model' (GLM) has produced very promising results on its effectiveness in criminal and forensic populations. This is mainly due to the nature of this model being more in the realm of positive psychology and helping clients focus on the 'positive' side of life. However, there is not much research on the application or effectiveness of this model on non-forensic populations. The following presentation will be guided towards the basics of applying the 'Good Lives Model' in combination with other CBT-based methods to the treatment of many different populations.
